AN ORDINANCE FOR APPROPRIATIONS AND TAX RATES OF THE TOWN OF HIGHLAND, LAKE COUNTY, INDIANA

BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED by the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana:

Section 1. That for the expenses of the Town of Highland for the year ending December 31, 2017, the sums herein specified are hereby appropriated and ordered set apart out of the several funds herein named and for the purposes herein specified, subject to the laws governing same. Such sums herein appropriated shall be held to include all expenditures authorized to be made during the year, unless otherwise expressly stipulated and provided by law;

Section 2. That in addition, for the purposes of raising revenue to meet the necessary expenses of the TOWN OF HIGHLAND, the property tax levies and property tax rates as herein specified are included herein. Budget Form 4-B for all funds are incorporated by the signing of this form and must be completed and submitted in the manner prescribed by the Department of Local Government Finance;

Section 3. That for the purposes of affecting reconcilment of revenues and planned expenditures, and still meeting the exigent needs of the municipality, the the following is found and determined:

(A)	That the requested appropriations for helmets in the Fire Department of the Corporation General Fund, having been reduced in its entirety, is hereby authorized to be amended into the budget of the cumulative capital development fund, in the amount of \$12,000;
(B)	That, in addition to the foregoing, the amount of \$85,000 be further amended into the budget of the cumulative capital development fund, to support the replacement of two regular vehicles assigned to the Fire Department;
(C)	That the fees and charges associated with animal control be reviewed and revised with the object being to support the establishment of a animal control or caretaker, and that the appropriate budget be amended to include a sufficient appropriation to provide for the established position;
(D)	That the forgoing be undertaken in the first quarter of the 2017 Fiscal Year and that the Clerk-Treasurer is hereby authorized to take such lawful steps as are necessary and desirable in order to carry out the findings and determinations set forth in Section 3 of this ordinance.

Section 4. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval by the Town Council of the Town of Highland, subject to its review and approval by the Department of Local Government Finance.

Upon a roll call vote, a unanimous vote being necessary, there were four affirmatives and no negatives. The motion passed. The ordinance was passed and adopted at the same meeting of its introduction.

ORDINANCE No. 1636 of the TOWN of HIGHLAND, INDIANA

AN ORDINANCE to AMEND VARIOUS TITLES of the HIGHLAND MUNICIPAL CODE, PARTICULARLY MODIFYING OR AMENDING CERTAIN USER FEES AND CHARGES, REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES in CONFLICT THEREWITH, and DECLARING an EMERGENCY

- WHEREAS, I.C. 36-1-3-4(b) specifically provides that a unit of local government has all powers granted it by statute and all other powers necessary or desirable in the conduct of its affairs, even though not granted by statute; and
- WHEREAS, IC 36-8-2 specifically provides that a unit of local government may regulate and license building and development in the municipality;
- WHEREAS, The Highland Town Council has determined that the amendment of certain fees and charges determined to be reasonable and just rates reasonably related to the administration of particular public functions is an exercise of local authority consistent with the provisions of IC 36-8-2-8 and necessary or desirable in the conduct of its affairs;
- WHEREAS, It would be and is in the best interest of the Town of Highland to enact such an ordinance as an amendment to the following sections of the Highland Municipal Code;
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT HEREBY ORDAINED BY the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana, as follows:

Section 1. That Section 15.05.020 of the Highland Municipal Code be repealed in its entirety and amended by adding a new Section to be numbered 15.05.020 to read as follows:

15.05.020 FEES AND CHARGES

15.05.020 Fees and charges.

(A) Buildings. The permit issued under this section will be valid for a period of 180 days. During the time of its validity, application for a refund for the full amount may be granted subject to a processing fee as fixed herein. Extensions may be applied for and granted subject to the appropriate renewal fee. No refund may be granted for any permit fees on a permit which has expired. Refunds may be granted for the value of the permit, which represents inspection, wrecking and other related fees, in the full amount of the fees, minus any fees for services already performed, subject to a processing fee as fixed herein. In all cases, plan review is conducted in advance of the issuance of a permit and is not recoverable.

Section 2. That Section 15.20.020 of the Highland Municipal Code be repealed in its entirety and amended by adding a new Section to be numbered 15.20.020 to read as follows:

15.20.020 Enforcement Officer: Assistant Inspector for Plumbing

(A) There is hereby created the position of assistant plumbing inspector assistant inspector for plumbing. The assistant plumbing inspector shall be appointed by and serve at the pleasure of the chief inspector/building commissioner. All references in this chapter to chief inspector, building commissioner or plumbing inspector shall mean the assistant plumbing inspector assistant inspector for plumbing.

(B) The assistant plumbing inspector assistant inspector for plumbing shall be a licensed plumber, licensed according to the laws and regulations of the state of Indiana. In appointing an assistant plumbing inspector assistant inspector for plumbing, the appointing authority shall make an earnest and reasonable effort to seek an individual who is also a resident of the town who is qualified pursuant to the terms of this section for appointment when possible. Before any such inspector shall enter upon his duties, he shall be required to take and subscribe an oath of office and shall file a bond in the sum of \$8,500 payable to the town, to be approved by the town. Said bond may be executed with any recognized and responsible surety company authorized to do business in the state of Indiana. The oath shall be filed in the office of the clerk-treasurer of the town. The bond shall be filed and recorded in the office of the recorder of Lake County, pursuant to IC 5-4-1-5.1.

(C) The **inspector assistant inspector for plumbing**, shall have no direct financial interest in any concern engaged in the business of the installation and maintenance of plumbing or devices, septic systems and devices in the town during his term of office as inspector.

(D) It shall be the duty of the inspector assistant inspector for plumbing to inspect and approve or reject all plans and drawings for the installation or alteration of plumbing connections or equipment, to make septic tank inspections, and to further inspect such plumbing work in all buildings, structures and things in the town required to be inspected by law. The inspector shall have the right, when necessary, to remove any existing obstructions which may prevent a complete inspection of plumbing equipment. He shall have such additional authority as may be necessary to carry out the purposes and procedures of this chapter.

(E) The **inspector assistant inspector for plumbing** shall have the *ex officio* power and authority to act in the capacity of the chief inspector at such times as the chief inspector may be absent due to vacation, illness, incapacity, or other legitimate reason; provided, that such ex officio powers shall not be exercised unless the assistant electrical inspector is also unable to act in his *ex officio* capacity. The exercise of such ex officio powers shall only be made upon the prior approval of the president of the town council or his designate.

(F) All fees collected in conjunction with the duties and powers of the assistant plumbing inspector assistant inspector for plumbing shall be paid immediately into the general fund of the town.

(G) The inspector assistant inspector for plumbing shall receive no annual salary but shall be compensated according to the following schedule: at the rate of \$15.00 for each one unit plumbing examination proceed as provided in HMC 15.20.100

- (1) For each one-unit plumbing examination proctored as provided in Section 15.20.100 of the Highland Municipal Code: \$17.00
- (2) For each inspection performed which include the following:

(a) Rough inspection	\$24.00 each.
(b) Final inspection	\$24.00 each.
(c) Underground	\$24.00 each.
d) Sewer tap inspection	\$24.00 each.
(e) Water tap inspection	\$24.00 each.
(f) Reinspections in consequence of red tagging	\$24.00 each.

Section 3. That Section 15.20.100 of the Highland Municipal Code be repealed in its entirety and amended by adding a new Section to be numbered 15.20.100 to read as follows:

15.20.100 Special provisions for homeowners desiring to perform plumbing work in their home.

(A) Except for licensed plumbers, any person desiring to perform plumbing work in that person's home or residence must register with the plumbing inspector before doing any plumbing. Such a person will be required to successfully complete a one-unit plumbing examination and pay an examination fee **as shown in the schedule below**. of \$35.00. Upon passing the examination, the person shall be required to apply for a one-unit plumbing work contemplated.

(B) If the applicant fails to pass the examination, he the applicant will not be permitted to take another examination for 90 days, and the fee will not be refunded.

Section 4. That Section 15.15.020 of the Highland Municipal Code be repealed in its entirety and amended by adding a new Section to be numbered 15.15.020 to read as follows:

15.15.020 Special provisions for homeowners desiring to perform electrical work in their home.

Any homeowner desiring to perform electrical work in his own home must, before doing any electrical work, register with the electrical inspector, and upon payment of a nonrefundable fee in the amount fixed herein as **shown in the schedule below**, request a one-unit examination. Upon successfully passing the examination, the homeowner may then apply for a one-unit permit. The fee shall be deposited with the office of the clerk-treasurer.

Section 5. That Section 5.20.050 of the Highland Municipal Code be repealed in its entirety and amended by adding a new Section to be numbered 5.20.050 to read as follows:

5.20.050 License application for Contractors.

(A) Except as otherwise provided in this chapter, any person over the age of 18 years and any corporation which satisfies the further requirements of this chapter shall be licensed by the council or its designee.

(B) Persons seeking to be licensed as a contractor or specialty contractor shall file a written application on a form to be provided by the council or its designee, which shall contain such information as the board or its designee deems necessary to determine the qualifications and competency of the applicant.

(C) The application, if filed on behalf of a firm, co-partnership, association, or corporation, shall contain also the name of the person who actively will manage said business and be licensed. Where a license shall be issued, authority to transact business thereunder as a contractor or specialty contractor shall be limited to one person

(officer) of such business to be designated in the application and named in the license. Each other person or employee of such business desiring to act as a contractor or specialty contractor in connection with the business of the firm, co-partnership, or corporation shall be required to take out a separate license.

(D) All applications shall be signed by the applicant or **it's the applicant's** duly authorized officer and shall be accompanied by a recommendation as to the character and honesty of the applicant from two citizens of this county who are not related to the applicant, or in the case of a corporation, its officer, and who shall be owners of real estate in the county where the applicant proposes to actively engage in the contracting business.

(E) Every application shall be accompanied by two recent photographs of the applicant, size one and one-half inches by two inches.

(F) Upon the filing of an application, the **council building commissioner** or **it**'s **the commissioner's** designee may investigate the statements contained herein and, if any statements are found to be untrue, may refuse to examine or license the applicant.

(G) Except as hereinafter provided, all individual applicants for a license as a contractor or a specialty contractor shall submit to and pass an oral and written examination conducted by the **council building commissioner** or **it's the commissioner's** designee. The contents of the examination herein required shall be developed by the designee of the board and he shall, for each license category, test the current levels of skills required of persons to be licensed in said category.

(H) Upon receipt of application and proof of fee payment as prescribed in this chapter, it shall be the duty of the **council building commissioner** or **it's the commissioner's** designee to set a date and notify applicant in writing at least five days before such examination.

(I) Any applicant who fails to qualify for a license as a contractor or specialty contractor may be reexamined at the next succeeding date for examination. But, in any event, any applicant who fails to qualify for the examination on two successive attempts shall be ineligible for reexamination for one year subsequent to the date of his last examination.

(J) Before a license is issued by the **council building commissioner** or **it's the commissioner's** designee to any applicant, the **council building commissioner** or **it's the commissioner's** designee shall require the applicant to file a bond with the county recorder's office in the amount of \$5,000. The bond shall be issued by a surety authorized to do business in Indiana, and be conditioned upon the faithful observance of the ordinances and laws of the county of Lake and state of Indiana relating to contracting and all rules and regulations promulgated thereunder.

(K) Whenever any contractor's license issued under the provisions of this chapter is revoked by the council **building commissioner** or it's **the commissioner's** designee, the council **building commissioner** or it's **the commissioner's** designee shall deliver the bond of the offending licensee to the town attorney who shall institute proceedings to forfeit the bond.

(L) Every license issued under the provisions of this chapter shall expire at the end of each calendar year (December 31st), and shall be renewed annually upon payment of the required renewal fees as a matter of right, if the applicant for renewal has not violated, during the preceding license period, any of the provisions of this chapter, or the rules and regulations promulgated pursuant thereto.

(M) Applications for renewal shall be filed with the **council building commissioner** or **it**'s **the commissioner**'s designee, on a form provided therefor, no later than 60 days prior to the expiration date of the licensee's current license. The application shall be accompanied by the required renewal fee. The **council building commissioner** or **it**'s **the commissioner's** designee, upon the receipt of the application for renewal and the required renewal fee, shall issue the license in the category said applicant has previously held; provided, that **he said applicant** had not violated any of the provisions of this chapter or the rules and regulations promulgated pursuant thereto.

(N) Upon receipt of an application for renewal by an applicant who, during the precedent licensed period, has violated any of the provisions of this chapter or any rules promulgated by the Council or **building commissioner** or **it's the commissioner's designee**, the <u>council</u> **building commissioner** or **it's the commissioner's designee** shall make such investigation as **it** the **building commissioner** or **it's the commissioner's designee** deems necessary to determine the fitness of the applicant for renewal of his license. In the event the **building commissioner** or **it's the commissioner's designee** determines of **it's the commissioner's designee** determines after said investigation that a question exists as to whether the application under consideration should be renewed, they or he shall so advise the applicant and he shall thereafter, within 30 days, show cause to the board or its designee why his license should be renewed. If, after hearing, the council or its designee determines that said license should not be

renewed, they or he shall notify the applicant and said applicant thereafter may seek remedies under the laws of the state of Indiana.

(O) No license shall be renewed during any period a license is under citation by the council building commissioner or it's the commissioner's designee, for violation of any of the provisions of this chapter or any rules promulgated by the council building commissioner or it's the commissioner's designee, however, the council building commissioner or it's the commissioner's designee, in their or his the building commissioner's discretion, may temporarily extend the applicant's current license for a period or periods of time not to exceed 30 days, or until the act complained of shall be heard by the council building commissioner or its designee, and during any period of appeal provided for by this chapter.

(P) Schedule of Fees. The fees to be charged by and paid to the council's designee by licensees for all licenses and renewals thereof shall be as follows:

- (1) A filing fee of **\$28.00** shall accompany an application for examination as a contractor;
- (2) A license fee of **\$56.00** shall be required for the initial issuance of the license upon successful approval of the application;
- (3) A license fee of **\$56.00** shall be required for every annual renewal of a license.

(Q) All fees assessed by the board and collected by the council's designee shall be paid into the office of the clerk-treasurer of the town of Highland and shall be credited to the town's general fund.

(R) All construction work in progress on the effective date of passage of this chapter shall be allowed to be completed without the issuance of a license.

(S) (R)In the event a licensee shall have been convicted in this state or any other state of obtaining money under false pretenses, extortion, forgery, embezzlement, or criminal conspiracy to defraud, or other like offenses, and a duly certified or exemplified copy of the record in the proceeding is filed with the council or its designee **building commissioner**, the council **building commissioner** shall revoke the license issued to the licensee. In the event of the revocation or suspension of the license issued to any member of a co-partnership, association, or corporation or an employee thereof, the license issued to the other co-partner, member, or members of the firm, association, or corporation shall be revoked unless, within the time fixed by the council or its designee, where a co-partnership or association, the connection of the member or employee whose license has been suspended (or revoked), shall be severed and his interest in the co-partnership or association, or his employment thereby in the case of any employee, be terminated, and his share in its activities brought to an end, or where a corporation, the offending officer or employee shall be discharged and shall have no further participation in the corporation activities.

Section 6. That Section 15.15.070 of the Highland Municipal Code be repealed in its entirety and amended by adding a new Section to be numbered 15.15.070 to read as follows:

15.15.070 Swimming pool installation and inspection.

(A) Any person, firm, or organization wishing to install a swimming pool within the territorial limits of the town shall obtain a permit from the proper department of the town prior to installation of the swimming pool.

(B) The electrical inspector of the town of Highland shall inspect the installation of the above-ground swimming pool upon its completion and before the final occupancy permit is given.

(C) Swimming pool permit and related fees are to be charged according to the following schedule:

Section 7. That Section 15.15.080 of the Highland Municipal Code be repealed in its entirety and amended by adding a new Section to be numbered 15.15.080 to read as follows:

15.15.080 Licensing of electrical contractors.

(A) Any electrical contractor, firm, corporation or electrical worker applying to the appropriate department or office of the town Building and Inspection Department of the Town of Highland for an electrical contractor's license shall pay to the town a nonrefundable sum as identified herein. of \$50.00.

(B) This **The following scheduled** fee shall be paid to the office of the clerk-treasurer. This fee shall be credited to the corporation general fund.

Electrical Contractor License Fee: \$56.00

Section 8. That Section 8.15.070 of the Highland Municipal Code be repealed in its entirety and amended by adding a new Section to be numbered 8.15.070 to read as follows:

8.15.070 Road cut permit fees.

- (A) Permit fees for the construction of open road cuts or jacking or sleeving operations shall be paid prior to the issuance of a permit.
- (B) A separate permit fee is required for each open road cut or jacking or sleeving operation.
- (C) Said fee shall be paid to the office of the clerk-treasurer.

(D) The permit will be valid for a period of 60 days. During the time of its validity, application for a refund for the full amount may be granted subject to a processing fee as fixed herein. No refund may be granted for any permit which has expired.

AN ORDER AUTHORIZING, AND APPROVING THE PAYMENT OF ELECTIVE REVENUE SHARING to the AMERICAN LEGION POST 180 OF HIGHLAND in Recognition of and in Goodwill for their SUPPORT AND COOPERATION IN RECENT FALL FESTIVAL EVENT

Whereas, The Town Council for the Town of Highland is the Legislative and Fiscal Body of the Municipality as well as the works board pursuant to IC 36-1-2 et seq.,

Whereas, The Highland Community Events Commission, did organize and Implement a Fall Festival at Main Square Park, Conducted October 21 through and Including October 23, 2016; and

Whereas, The Highland Community Events Commission did enlist American Legion Post 180 of Highland, Indiana to assist with the staffing and operation of a Beer Garden at the event;

Whereas, The Highland Community Events Commission has informed the Town Council that it has been customary for the payment of an honorarium or stipend to some of the supporting groups in recognition of their special contribution and cooperation in support of the organization and implementation of an event;

Whereas, The Highland Community Events Commission has further recommended, requested and identified appropriations in the Special Events Non Reverting Fund be authorized to support payments to the American Legion Post 180 in recognition of its special efforts cooperation and support of the Fall Festival in general and the execution of the Beer Garden in particular;

Whereas, The Town Council has been reliably advised that the American Legion Post 180 performed as volunteers without remuneration, but did expend time, labor, money and cooperative energy to support the Town of Highland's Fall Festival and Beer Garden; and,

Whereas, Under its authority of IC 36-1-3, The Town passed and adopted Section 2.35.030 of the Highland Municipal Code which provides in pertinent part that the Town Council is authorized to budget and appropriate funds from the general fund of the town to pay the expenses incurred in promoting the best interests of the town and that such expenses may include, but not necessarily be limited to those incurred in developing relations with other units of government or any other expenses of civic or governmental nature deemed by the Town Council to be in the interests of the Town; and

Whereas, The Town Council has reviewed the matter, and now desires to make findings and determinations related to these recommendations and requests and to favor the recommendation and request of the Community Events Commission,

Now Therefore Be it hereby Ordered BY the Town Council of the Town of Highland, Lake County, Indiana;

Section 1. That the Town Council hereby finds and determines that the forgoing activities and items of expense are lawful and proper expenses incurred in promoting the best interests of the Town as set forth in Section §33.03 of the Highland Municipal Code which reads as follows:

§ 2.35.030 AUTHORITY OF TOWN COUNCIL TO REIMBURSE TOWN OFFICIALS FOR CERTAIN EXPENSES.

The Town Council is hereby authorized to budget and appropriate funds from the general fund of the town to pay the expenses of, and to reimburse, town officials for expenses incurred in promoting the best interests of the town. Such expenses may include, but not necessarily be limited to meals, decorations, memorabilia, awards, expenses incurred in interviewing job applicants, expenses incurred in promoting industrial, commercial, and residential development, expenses incurred in developing relations with other units of government, and any other expenses of civic or governmental nature deemed by the Town Council to be in the interests of the town.

Section 2. That the Town Council hereby further finds that American Legion Post 180 of Highland participated in the Fall Festival, sharing some costs, purchasing and holding the appropriate license to dispense beer for sale and provided volunteers to staff the Beer Garden associated with the Fall Festival;

Section 3. That the Town Council still further finds and determines that the activities and expenses as described herein, while not paid from the Corporation General Fund, are uses and expenditures consistent with the purposes of the Special Events Non Reverting Fund, when proper appropriations are accordingly approved;

Section 4. That in consequence of and supported by the foregoing findings and determinations, the Town Council hereby authorizes and orders that the American Legion Post 180 of Highland be paid as follows:

(A) That the American Legion Post 180 be paid an elective refund in the amount equal to its cost incurred from applying for and obtaining the proper permit from the Alcohol and Tobacco Commission in order to support the Beer Garden at the Fall Festival (if applicable); and

(B) That the American Legion Post 180 be paid an elective refund in an amount representing approximately forty percent (40%) of value of a deposit received by the Town from the vendor supplier of the beer beverages , which was the share of the costs borne by the American Legion as voluntary partner with the Community Events Commission for this special event (if applicable); and,

(C) That the American Legion Post 180 be paid an elective share of the net proceeds earned from Beer Garden activity in an amount representing approximately forty percent (40%) of the net proceeds earned from Beer Garden activity, in recognition of the valuable cooperation exhibited by the American Legion as voluntary, and highly valued partner with the Community Events Commission for this special event;

Section 5. That the Clerk-Treasurer is hereby authorized and instructed to prepare an accounts payable voucher against the appropriate fund and account for the benefit *American Legion Post 180* depicting the expense as according to the provisions of this order in the amounts herein fixed, and to take such other measures to carry-out the purposes and objects of this order.
